

Loopogram

Radiology

The aim of this leaflet

It is not meant to replace informed discussion between you and your doctor, it is to explain what is involved and what will happen to you and to explain the possible risks of this procedure.

What is a Loopogram?

It is an X-ray examination of your ileal conduit or stoma (this is where the bowel is brought through the abdominal wall). This examination is sometimes known as an ileal conduitogram. The X-ray shows your kidneys, ureters, ileum (the loop of bowel that your ureters are now attached to), and stoma. In order to show these structures, a contrast media (X-ray dye) will be injected into your stoma via a thin rubber catheter (tube)

What happens during a Loopogram?

You will be asked to change into an examination gown. Please place your clothes/belongings in the bag provided and keep them with you at all times. You will be asked to lie on your back on the X-ray examination couch. The stoma bag will be removed and a lubricated rubber catheter with be placed into your stoma. A small balloon on the end of the catheter is inflated to create a seal. Contrast media (X-ray dye) will be injected through the catheter to enable visualisation of the ileum, ureters and kidneys on the X-ray monitor. Several images will be taken in different positions. The examination is usually painless. When the required images have been obtained, the tube will be removed. There may be some leakage from the stoma for a while, but this will soon stop and your new stoma bag can be applied.

How long will it take?

The examination usually takes between 20-30 minutes. You are advised to allow up to 1 hour in the Radiology Department.

Is there any preparation?

No, you can eat and drink normally.

The prevention of infection is a major priority in all healthcare and everyone has a part to play.

- Please decontaminate your hands frequently for 20 seconds using soap and water or alcohol gel if available
- If you have symptoms of diarrhoea and/or vomiting, cough or other respiratory symptoms, a temperature or any loss of taste or smell please do not visit the hospital or any other care facility and seek advice from 111
- Keep the environment clean and tidy
- Let's work together to keep infections out of our hospitals and care homes.

Do I need to bring anything / anyone with me?

Please bring a dressing gown and slippers if you have them. You will be provided with a cotton gown to wear for the examination. Do not bring unnecessary amounts of money or valuables.

Please bring a spare stoma bag with you as your bag will have to be removed to undertake the procedure.

What if I am Diabetic?

No special requirements.

Are you pregnant?

To ensure that you are not pregnant you should have this examination between the 1st and 10th day of your menstrual period.

If you have not started your period in the 10 days before this appointment or you are actively trying for a family please contact the X ray department, it may be necessary to re arrange your appointment

Please contact the Radiology Department as soon as you receive this appointment if you think you may be pregnant.

Are there any risks or side effects?

Radiation

There are some risks involved with the use of X-rays.

The overriding concern of your Doctor and Radiology is to ensure that when radiation is used the benefits from making the right diagnosis outweigh any small risk involved.

Radiologists / Radiographers who perform the examination are trained to ensure that the radiation dose associated with the examination is always kept to a minimum.

When will I get the results?

The X-rays need to be studied and a report issued, so we will not be able to give you your results straight away. The Radiographer will advise you where and when to get your results.

Student training

A student Radiographer may be present during the examination. If you would prefer them not to be present, please let the Radiographer know at the time.
