Introduction

This leaflet will help you learn about having a plaster cast applied and how to look after the cast.

Why are plaster casts applied?

Plaster casts are usually applied in the Emergency Department because a fracture or break of a bone is suspected. Sometimes plaster casts are applied for other injuries.

Your cast needs to be kept dry at all times, including when bathing. Any moisture to the cast will make it crumble.

How should I hold my arm if it is in a cast?

Try to keep any fractured arm raised whenever possible. Try placing a few pillows under your arm when you are sitting. This helps to reduce the swelling that develops after a fracture.

How should I place my leg if it is in a cast?

When you are sitting with a fracture of your leg, try to raise your leg higher than your hip, if it is safe and comfortable for you to do so.

Can I put weight on my injured leg?

You will be informed before you leave the emergency department whether you are allowed to put some weight on the injured limb.

When should I return to the emergency department or fracture clinic?

- The plaster is uncomfortable, or is hurting you because it is rubbing or it is too tight or too loose
- The plaster becomes soft or cracks
- Excessive swelling of your fingers or toes
- Greyness or blueness other than bruising
- Prolonged pins and needles
- Intense pain which is not relieved when the limb is raised
- You are unable to move your fingers or toes
- Numbness, loss of feeling or unusual coldness
- Any other concerns regarding your plaster.

What else do I need to remember to do?

Please return your crutches when you no longer need them. We are so grateful if you can do this.
