Introduction

This leaflet is for people who have been prescribed with insoles

Your insoles have been prescribed for you and should not be worn by anybody else.

Care of your feet

You should do the following on a daily basis:

1. Inspect all aspects of your feet daily which come into contact with the insole checking for red marks, abrasions, bruising or wounds. Use a mirror or ask someone for help if necessary
2. If you are experiencing discomfort or the skin is markedly red, bruised or broken please contact the orthotics department immediately for advice
3. Always check your footwear for stones or debris before putting them on

Review appointments and maintenance of your insoles

The orthotics department has a patient initiated follow-up policy, which means you can contact us when you feel you need a review appointment. Your orthotist will advise you how often you should have your insoles reviewed.

If you have any concerns regarding your insoles please contact the orthotics department directly to seek advice or request a review appointment.

If the top cover of your insole is getting worn it may be replaced. Contact the orthotics department for advice on this.
