


A pseudo strabismus or pseudo squint is the false appearance of a 'squint'. It looks as if one or both eyes turn in, out, up or down; but in fact the eyes are straight. This false impression of a squint is often most noticeable in photographs:

Pseudo ('false') strabismus - the light reflections (white dots) are central in each eye.

The prevention of infection is a major priority in all healthcare and everyone has a part to play.

**True strabismus (squint)** – the light reflection (white dot) is central in the right eye, but on the edge of the coloured part of the left eye. This shows a true left convergent squint (left eye turning in).

# What causes a pseudo strabismus?

The most common cause is epicanthus. This is folds of skin over the inside corner of one or both eyes and often occurs with a flat bridge of the nose. Other causes include a large or narrow distance between the eyes, different coloured eyes (heterochromia), difference in level of the upper eyelids, uneven facial features or a difference in the size of the pupils (the central black circle in the middle of the eye).

# Is it common?

Yes. Many babies (Approximate age 0-3 years) have pseudo strabismus.

# What is the treatment?

No treatment is required. As your child grows, the bridge of the nose will develop, and the pseudo strabismus (false appearance of squint) will become less noticeable.

# Assessment of your child

The Orthoptist will check your child's vision in each eye and check to ensure that your child does not have a true strabismus (squint). Your child will be monitored until we are able to test their vision using pictures or letters in a row. Your child may then be discharged to school vision screening or the local Optician for continued care.

# **Testing for glasses**

Your child will be tested to see if they need glasses at approximately 2 years old by a hospital Optician.

# Benefits of assessment

Peace of mind - to know your child doesn't have a true squint and that their vision is good. If your child is found to have a squint, it is helpful to find out early in order to receive advice on the best course of management and if any treatment is required.

# Risks of not having assessment for pseudo strabismus

A true squint can occur in children at different ages and can cause significant vision problems if left untreated. It is important to attend all hospital appointments even if your child has been found to have pseudo strabismus as a baby, as they may still develop a true squint when they are older.

### Future vision assessment

Children in Shropshire county primary schools are funded for a vision screening check by an Orthoptist in their reception year at age 4-5 years old. Older children able to attend the local Optician are entitled to free eye examinations until the age of 16 years.
