

# **Distal Feeding**

Colorectal Nursing

This leaflet is produced to give you some general information about your treatment. It is intended to support the teaching you will receive from your colorectal or nutrition specialist nurse if you need to use distal feeding at home.

### What is distal feeding?

Distal feeding is sometimes known as fistuloclysis and means inserting a feeding tube into your fistula / stoma and administering a liquid feed into your bowel. A stoma bag is then fitted over the feeding tube which is connected to a giving set which allows the feed to be administered slowly into the bowel.

### Why do I need distal feeding?

As you are unable to absorb enough nutrition from food at present, it has been recommended that distal feeding be considered. This type of feeding may allow you to absorb enough nutrients to reduce or stop parenteral nutrition (receiving intravenous nutrition).

When possible, it is important to use your bowel and keep it working, especially if you are coming back for closure of your fistula / stoma. The large bowel can absorb water and sodium (salt). It can also absorb some nutrients over time and in many cases it may be quicker to start eating again after surgery.

### Are there any side effects?

Possible symptoms may include some abdominal discomfort, although this gradually reduces as the feed is increased. It is also possible that you may experience some diarrhoea. These symptoms should improve over time and can be treated with medications. Occasionally tube displacement and blockage can occur.

### What will happen?

Once you have consented for this treatment you will need to have a feeding tube placed into your stoma / fistula. This will be done by a trained professional. The tube is held in place by a balloon filled with water. When this has been done you will be seen by a stoma nurse and a pouch / bag will be placed over the tube.

Feeding will be built up gradually. This may be done using a pump to push the feed through slowly or via a syringe (bolus feeding). Your dietitian will supply a feeding plan and monitor your progress.


The prevention of infection is a major priority in all healthcare and everyone has a part to play.

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## What happens afterwards?

This type of feeding is often temporary whilst you are in hospital but sometimes, for a more extended period you may go home with it. If you are discharged on this type of feed, you or a family member will receive training from the nutrition nurse on how to give the feed and look after the tube. The stoma nurse will teach you how to apply a new bag, and this is demonstrated in the following pictures.



### Items required:

- A Feeding tube
- B Stoma Bag
- C Cone System
- D Giving set
- **E** Scissors



Put the blue cone into the stoma bag through the opening.



Feed the blue cone down to the desired position, which is usually on the lower end of the bag.





Take the white rubber cone and put it on top of the blue one.



Press the two cones firmly together so they snap together. The white cone should now be attached to the white ring of the blue cone. The blue cone can now be removed.



Cut the end off the white cone to create a small opening.



Take the end of the gastrostomy feeding tube and insert into the white cone.



Continue to manoeuvre the tube into the bag through the opening until the end of the tube and white cone are level as shown in the picture.



Then attach the giving set.



This is how it should look.
